2006 Challenge Projects

Now is your chance to go back and review the 2005 demonstrations, sign out the videos, read the reviews. Our 2006 Challenge Projects are generally based on the 2005 demonstrations, plus a few more to keep you turning!

- * January - bottle stoppers, napkin rings, or flower holders.
- * February - crotch turning.
- * March - texturing, carving and finishes.
- * April - polychromatic, layered, laminated, segmented, pegging, inlays, or stave construction.
- * May - Alabaster turning (main challenge); natural edge bowl (secondary challenge).
- * June - bowl (but not just any bowl -- make it "special", and tell us why!).
- * July - hollowing.
- * August - lidded vessels.
- * September - toothpick holder or pen/pencil holder.
- * October -goblet.
- * November - Multi-center or offset turning.
- * December - finials.

The Beginner's Corner



Each of us who have some experience at turning has developed a set of preferred sources for the various tools and supplies that we require in our every day work. This month I'm going to share my preferences with you. If you haven't already developed your own preferences you might want to try mine.

I've bought tools from four sources and have found all of them to be very satisfactory. The granddaddy of the turning catalogues is *The Woodturners Catalog* put out by Craft Supplies USA in Provo Utah. If you don't have their catalogue be sure to get one, 1-800-551-8876 or www.woodturnerscatalog.com. A more recent entry is *The Woodturners Source* by Packard Woodworks, Inc in Tryon NC, 1-800-683-8876 or www.packardwoodworks.com. My third source is Klingspor's Woodworking Shop where we meet each month. If you are considering purchasing a new tool it's best to review both catalogues as well as look over the stock at The Woodworking Shop. The advantage of shopping at Klingspor is that you can handle the tool and see how it feels to you. The 10% percent discount is nice, too. The catalogues by both Craft Supplies and Packard are very well done with lots of pictures and descriptions. The Packard organization is very customer friendly. Brad Packard is a turner and either he or his wife Debbie is a good source of information on the products they carry.



If you are getting into hollowing you might want to consider a tool with a stabilizing arm like the one shown here. Al Basham 1-919-469-1064 or albasham@nc.rr.com has a variety of styles; you make your own handle and it should be extra long. If you can sketch a special tool you want I believe Al will make it for you.

The cutting tip on this tool is a shaper blade purchased at Sears Roebuck that I've ground as a shear scraper. It can be ground into any shape that suits the job. Other high-speed steel cutters are offered in the catalogues at about \$7 each. Mine cost half that.

I buy Starbond cyanoacrylate glue from CPH International 1-800-900-4583 or www.Starbond.com. Other brands cost 40% to 100% more and I've been totally satisfied with the results. In addition each 2 oz bottle comes with an extra nozzle and cap and several very small nozzles that are useful for putting the glue exactly where you want it. I keep in my shop the very thin viscosity as well as 150 and 600 viscosity. These cover everything I need to do. They also offer both black and brown colored glue at twice the regular price. I doubt if it's worth it.

I use hook and loop power sanding mandrels I buy from Industrial Abrasives Co 1-800-428-2222 or www.industrialabrasives.com. My preference is for the somewhat firmer pads they sell rather than the very soft ones sold elsewhere. However, as I told you in September get the sanding discs from Klingspor where you can be sure of the flex of the backing. Buying sandpaper from a catalogue is a risky proposition.

Either Walmart or Lowes is a good source for lacquer, sanding sealer, acetone and alcohol.

Some of you other members must have developed sources you trust for products you need. Send me the information and I'll publish it here in a future column.
