Program Notes – Warren Carpenter – August 14th, 10:00am to 4:00 pm

"My wood creations are primarily turned objects. The challenge of finding the beauty and uniqueness in a piece of wood, especially a burl or crotch of a tree, drives me to turn. I have experimented with cutting and laminations. I have developed a technique of inserting walnut shell slices into imperfections in bowls. Some people think that I am "nuts" when they see my wal"nut" burl forms turned completely out of walnut shells. My wine stoppers sell best, because of their unique appearance and price point. "

Ever since Sam invented the lathe, he's been a busy man. This month, Sam started with a "Butterfly" bowl. You know the kind, looks like a butterfly, got wings. I was amazed to see someone actually do something like this and leave with all their appendages. Still attached, I mean. Sam invented this technique too. His eloquence and humor made the time fly by.

Sam made some comments about cellular water and free water and how they act differently when it comes to drying. He also talked about using poly to finish his bowls, pros and cons, and how to use heat to attain a higher shine with poly. This is why we attend these meetings. A gold mine of learning techniques is available with each event.

After lunch, Sam discussed turning a cherry burl, not that I would need to know, but I did pay *very* good attention. Later, he started honkin' down on a burl that I would love to see when it's finished.

I am once again amazed at the openness and camaraderie experienced among fellow turners. An example:
